International Blues Challenge Brings the Best from throughout the World to Compete in Memphis

Beale Street in Memphis is quiet this week — at least as quiet as it ever is — after the world's top Blues performers descended for the 34th International Blues Challenge (IBC) in late January. Representing Blues societies and organizations from Norway to Vancouver and throughout the United States, bands, solo performers and duo acts packed their hopes and dreams with their instruments, and arrangements, intending to impress the judges and audiences.

DCBS was represented by **Lady D and the Rogue Johnsen Trio** in the band catgory. The band kicked off its first-round performance with a spirited set that brought the appreciative crowd at the Rum Boogie Cafe to its feet but they missed scoring sufficient points to move to the next round.

The group includes the soaring vocals of Lady D (Doris Fields), Rogue Johnsen on vocals and keyboard, Jim Barrett on sax and drummer Earl Ivey.

Veteran singers and guitarists **Patty Reese and Dave Chappell** won the 2017 DCBS Solo/Duo Competition and competed in the same IBC category. Both are fan favorites in the DMV and have been honored with many WAMMIES (Washington Area Music Awards) and other awards. The pair took their strong act into the first round but missed making the semi-finals.

Patty Reese's recent CD, *Let In the Sun*, fared better in the Self-Produced CD category, making the cut to advance to the semi-final round. *Let In the Sun* lost in the category to *Blue Metamorphosis* by Jontavious Willis, representing the Atlanta Blues Society.







Remembering Denise LaSalle, Preston Shannon, Billy Hancock

Blues enthusiasts throughout the world are mourning the passings of three musicians whose local performances thrilled and moved DCBS members. Singer and songwriter Denise LaSalle, 83; singer and Beale Street fixture Preston Shannon, 70; and singer, producer, guitarist, bassist and local legend Billy Hancock, 71, died in January. Their contributions to the genre are noteworthy, and they will be missed.

Known for her million-selling 1971 ballad "Trapped by a Thing Called Love," singer and songwriter **Denise LaSalle** died Jan. 8 in Jackson, TN. She was a frequent and friendly performer in area clubs and was recently nominated for a 2018 Blues Music Award in the Soul Blues Female Artist category.

Ms. LaSalle was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2011 with a citation that noted her "bold and bawdy stage act." Her songs and performances combined romance and raunchiness, dealing with love, cheating, pleasure and heartache.

"Ms. LaSalle can be joyously filthy," wrote New York Times reviewer Peter Watrous in 1988. "One second she'd be uproariously funny, the next she'd be singing as if her heart had been broken and the world was going to end."

In the 1970s, Ms. LaSalle had R&B hits, "Now Run and Tell That," "Man-Sized Job" and "Married, But Not to Each Other." In recent years, she worked to start a school for young musicians in Jackson.

She is survived by her husband James E. Wolfe, Jr., founder of WFKX in Jackson, and three children.

Singer, songwriter and guitarist **Preston Shannon**, "The King of Beale Street," lost his battle with cancer on Jan. 22 in Memphis.

"Shannon's specialty is a blend of Southern-fried soul and blues," writes biographer Richard Skelly.

"(He) delivers soul-filled vocals atop his burning, venom-tipped guitar chords."

Mr. Shannon's distinctive, gutteral vocals and fierce guitar playing set him on a path as a professional musician, after a first career as a hardware salesman. He signed with Rounder Records in 1994 and his debut album, *Break the Ice*, was released the same year, followed by *Midnight in Memphis* in 1996 and *All in Time* in 1999. He cut a familiar figure in many Memphis clubs for three decades.

Although a Memphis homebody, in the recent years, Mr. Shannon traveled to festivals throughout the nation. He occasionally brought his unique sound to the DC area, and headlined the 2011 DC Blues Festival, to the delight of his many veteran — and new — fans. He also performed at the 2011 Festival's After Party and at a DCBS event at Lamont's in 2012.

Billy Hancock, known for his rockabilly music, his over-the-top stage presence, his pompadour hair and his collaboration with guitarist Danny Gatton, died from liver and kidney failure on Jan. 22 in LaPlata.

Mr. Hancock's career stretched for 50+ years and featured his talents on many instruments. He was a world-class guitarist, singer, songwriter, producer and actor. His performances included unique singing, searing guitar playing, frantic dancing

and stripping off his shirt — antics which never overshadowed his razor-sharp musicianship.

In the 1970s, Mr. Hancock sang and played bass with local guitar virtuoso Danny Gatton in Danny and the Fat Boys. The band's 1976 album, *American Music*, mixed songs from a variety of genres from rockability to doo-wop, many of which were written by Mr. Hancock. He refused to be pidgeon-holed and his later albums, *On the Jazz* and *Out of the Darkness*, featured Dixieland Blues standards and Southern soul.

Mr. Hancock produced the first albums of The Nighthawks and guitarist Tom Principato. In 2002, he joined his brother Dale to found Turkey Mountain Records which released archival recordings of Roy Buchanan, Danny Gatton and Link Wray, as well as his own.

During his prolific performing career, Mr. Hancock shared the stage with Fats Domino, Janis Joplin, guitar pioneer Les Paul, Arthur "Big Boy" Crudup, Rockabilly pioneer Charlie Feathers, and Delta Blues singer Sleepy John Estes and many others. He received a Special Recognition Award WHAMMIE (Washington Area Music Assn.) in 2005 and was inducted into the Rockabilly Halls of Fame in the US and Europe.

He is survived by his wife, Carrie Slark. A celebration of his life and music is being planned for the spring.

During IBC week, The Blues Foundation also bestowed its "Keeping the Blues Alive" Awards to individuals and organizations whose efforts have advocated for the genre and its legacy. This year, Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival founder and organizer Don Hooker and his daughter, Sarah, were among the recipients. The Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival is held at Sandy Point State Park each year and consistently features a strong line-up year. Past performers include John Lee Hooker, James Brown, Otis Rush, Robert Cray, Taj Mahal, Koko Taylor, Wilson Pickett, Buddy Guy, Aretha Franklin, Chuck Berry, Bonnie Raitt, Joe Bonamassa, Shemekia Copeland, Trombone Shorty and the Tedeschi Trucks Band. The festival donates 100% of its proceeds to charity, with neither leader taking any salary from their festival work, and has raised more than \$1 million for regional charities. Congratulations to the Hookers!

It's Not a Dream — You're on the Blues Cruise #29!

Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise #29 set sail on Oct. 21, 2017 from Ft. Lauderdale with 2,000 blues fanatics ready for lots of blues, fun and stops in Curacao and Aruba.

Public Service Announcement: this is **NOT** a typical cruise you may have heard about with enforced eating times and formal dress, being with people with nothing in common and entertainment you really don't like.

Imagine being in a place where there are no problems, everyone gets along and you are hanging out with the coolest people from all over the world listening to the best music, eating incredible food in a very casual, first-rate place — you're not dreaming, you're on the blues cruise.

Before we left the dock, I got to meet Elvin Bishop, Cyril Neville and Marcus King while waiting in line to get lunch. What a way to start! Here are some highlights from the cruise as it happened over seven days, with music on five different stages:

- ▲ Elvin Bishop I finally got to see this legend play. I have been a fan since I was a teenager and Elvin is 75 now! He's still going strong, funny as ever with a fine band playing songs that only Elvin can get away with like "I'm Old School" and "Can't Even Do Wrong Right."
- ▲ Booker T. Jones I finally got to see the guy who with the MG's did "Green Onions" and many other classics. He played

on all of the famous Stax records and talked about playing and writing songs with Otis Redding, Sam & Dave, Aretha Franklin. A very classy man.

- ▲ **Chubby Carrier** makes you feel happy and you can't stand still when he plays zydeco.
- ▲ **Ruthie Foster** is from Texas and plays blues, country and gospel. She brings tears of joy when I hear some of her songs. Met her on an elevator ride and she was so friendly.
- ▲ Coco Montoya plays tasteful guitar with fine singing, showing influences he got from playing with Albert Collins and John Mayall.
- ▲ If you need a break, you can go to your

cabin and watch **Blues TV!** It features live shows from the Showroom, a radio show with Rev. Billy Wirtz's Rockin Rhythm Revival and movies like the NIGHTHAWKS ON THE BLUE HIGHWAY.

- ▲ Besides the legends including the still amazing **Buddy Guy!** there were several young players who wowed me. **Marcus King,** at 21, is a super talented singer and guitar player who is taking the music world by storm. He plays blues, rock, soul and some jazz with lots of improvisation. Look out for this guy I bet he is going to be a star!
- ▲ Christone "Kingfish" Ingram is only 18

years old from Clarksdale, MS and wowed the crowd at every show with his singing and guitar. He is a phenomenon and destined for greatness.

- ▲ Samantha Fish has grown up as a musician since I saw her five years ago with a trio. She now has two horns and keyboards behind her, and I'm very impressed with her new sound.
- A Wee Willie Walker & Frank Bey with the Anthony Paule Soul Orchestra were a big hit. The band can play swing, soul and blues, and each singer is spotlighted during the set.
- ▲ The California Honeydrops won over the crowd every time with their infectious blend of New Orleans style blues and funk. They got people to dance crazy and hosted a very popular late night jam known as the Captain Jammies jam every night that went until dawn.
- A Bettye LaVette is 71 years young and as she said, is finally making it. She has an incredible voice, a great band, dances like someone a lot younger and sings a wide variety of song styles.
- ▲ The TajMo Band with Taj Mahal & Keb Mo were my favorites and I saw them

three times. Both are legends and these guys complimented each other so well. What a treat to see them together.

- ▲ Veteran cruiser tips: stay hydrated, use sunscreen and pace yourself. I did two of three.
- ▲ We docked in two beautiful ports. We spent a fun day in beautiful Curacao, where no building can be painted white, and another day in Aruba, which has beautiful beaches.
- ▲ A few mornings started with entertaining workshops. One session featured Elvin Bishop, Booker T, Ruthie Foster and others talking about songwriting. Another featured young stars like Mr. Sipp, Kingfish and Samantha Fish talking about the responsibility of "carrying the torch" and some experiences with their mentors.
- ▲ I like the autograph and meet-and-greet sessions where you can say hi, get autographs and take pictures with the artists.
- ▲ The last day was a full day of music. Mr. Sipp showed why he won the International Blues Challenge a few years ago. He played to a packed room of people dancing wildly and waving their hands like they were in a Mississippi Juke Joint. You've got to see him.
- ▲ **The TajMo Band** did their final show and added a lot of new songs to the set. This was

a very emotional show, the last show they would play after a six-month tour. I hope these guys can find time to get together again.

▲ Elvin Bishop played the last scheduled show. Tommy Castro came out to play three songs with his long-time friend and the crowd would not leave the Ballroom so they came out again to play more songs. A guy next to me said, "We are so blessed." The Capt. Jammies jam went on past 3 AM. We docked in Ft. Lauderdale on Oct. 28.

Blues Cruise #29 was a fantastic experience and incredible good time. I tried really hard but still didn't get to see all the performers. I did hang out with friends, made some new friends from around the world and listened to music all day and night. With more than 100 shows and jams, this cruise lived up to its legendary name. But it wasn't a dream — I was on the Blues Cruise!

Winning Hand: Tinsley Ellis Demonstrates His Fire, Emotion

Nearly 30 years since he first recorded for Alligator Records (and 20 since his last Alligator album, Tinsley Ellis returns with an album of house rocking blues and rock, showcasing his brawny, volcanic guitar and husky singing. He is joined by Kevin McKendree on

keyboards (who co-produced this with Ellis), Steve Mackey on bass and Lynn Williams on drums that was engineered and mixed by McKendree at The Rock House.

Nine of the 10 songs are Ellis originals and display the range of his music starting with the searing, hold-no-prisoners opening blues-rock of "Sound of a Broken Man." In contrast, the easy rocking shuffle blues, "Nothing But Fine," illustrates the clarity and precision, along with fire, of his playing with a more relaxed vocal. "Gamblin' Man," is a nice original blues performance (the melody slightly evocative of Boz Scaggs' recording



of "Someone Loan Me a Dime"), with a well-shaped, fiery guitar solo and a heartfelt, expressive vocal.

Another fine blues performance is "Don't Turn Off The Light." There is also high energy,

blues-rock of "Kiss This World" with its swelling groove and the rock and roll of "Satisfied," with McKendree's rollicking road house piano in addition to Ellis' guitar. The one cover, Leon Russell's "Dixie Lullaby," sports more rollicking piano (and organ grease) along with some fiery Freddie King inspired guitar.

This is another impressive collection of music from Ellis whose playing shows him still to be a tone master and a fiery guitar slinger. His high energy playing is firmly backed by the terrific studio band. Ellis is



also a most congenial, expressive singer and contributed some solid original blues on this memorable blues-rock release.

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
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DCBS Announces March 11 Show:
