

Blues Foundation Blues Hall of Fame

Since 1980, The Blues Foundation has been inducting individuals, recordings and literature into the Blues Hall of Fame, but until now there has not been a physical Blues Hall of Fame. Establishing a Blues Hall of Fame enhances one of the founding programs of The Blues Foundation. The campaign calls for up to \$3.5 million to create a hall of fame that will be the place to: honor inductees year-round; listen to and learn about the music; and enjoy historic mementos of this all-American art form. The new Blues Music Hall of Fame will be the place for serious blues fans, casual visitors, and wide-eyed students. It will facilitate audience development and membership growth. It will expose, enlighten, educate, and entertain. (www.blues.org)

The DCBS supports this very worthy cause and will be making a donation. The Hall of Fame is an opportunity to further enshrine the Blues as the mother of all American music. (The International Blues Month notion, which I proposed in last month's President's Drum, will probably have to wait with this capital campaign going on.) Anyone can donate to the Blues Hall of Fame. 
Annual Hotter-Than-July Fish Fry & Show

So many Blues venues, so little time - and money. Whatever your constraints, try to check out a new venue when it first hits town or begins promoting the Blues. It's a shame to discover a new spot when it's on its last legs because of a lack of support from Blues fans. I recently became acquainted with a couple of new venues (new to me at least) around town that you might want to visit. A while back I saw Cassie Taylor, daughter of Otis Taylor, at Hill Country Barbecue, at 410 Seventh St. N.W. In addition to the delightfully entrancing performance by Cassie, the venue is a welcoming and well-appointed space. The upper level is for dining. Their brand tag is: "Honoring the Barbecue & Live Music of Texas." So you know what the house specialty is. The lower level is a spacious room for live music, with a bar, an ample stage, and great acoustics. See what they're all about at www.hillcountrywdc.com. Then pay them a visit.

The other joint I've only heard about is the Bossa Bistro & Lounge at 2463 18th Street NW DC 20009. Bossa presents live music Sunday. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The venue features house, Latin & lately Blues music. The club in the heart of Adams Morgan also kicks in This show is co-sponsored by Indie Adams Morgan. Check them out dining, poetry, and rotating art exhibits to round out its eclectic mix. Lady Rose and her band recently performed there and are looking forward to returning. 

Up Close & Personal with John Hammond, Prior to His Tinner Hill Blues Festival Performance

It should be no surprise that singer/guitarist John Paul Hammond is a musician. It's in his blood. Hammond, who on Friday, June 7 will play the State Theatre in Falls Church, VA as part of the 2013 Tinner Hill Blues Festival, is the son of famous record producer and talent scout John Henry Hammond. The senior Hammond is known, by his son's account, for discovering artists ranging from Billie Holiday to Lester Young, Bob Dylan, and Bruce Springsteen.

Sometimes referred to as John Hammond, Jr., Hammond the son has had several brushes of his own with musical history during his forty-year career. For example, he is the only musician known to have played in a band featuring both Jimi Hendrix and Eric Clapton. He also advised Hendrix to travel to England—a move that essentially launched the guitarist to fame. Hammond also befriended Willie Dixon and Duane Allman, got to know Muddy Waters and Howlin' Wolf, and shared a show with Jimmy Reed. He enlisted members of the Band as *his* back-up band for an album—then saw Bob Dylan steal them away. He attended parties hosted in New York City by blues shouter and songwriter Victory Spivey. Spivey once recorded him playing with Otis Spann and Bob Dylan in the same session.

Performing live on guitar and harp-on-a-rack, Hammond plays classic blues songs from the 30's, 40's, and 50's. He has recorded more than 30 albums since debuting on Vanguard Records in 1962. In 1985 he won a Grammy for the compilation album *Blues Explosion*, which also featured Sugar Blue, J.B. Hutto, Luther "Guitar Junior" Johnson, Koko Taylor and Stevie Ray Vaughan. He has received four other Grammy nominations, including one in 2010 for his album *Rough and Tough*. In 2011, he was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame by the Blues Foundation.

Hammond recently spoke at length to Beldon's Blues Point (BBP) (aka DCBS member Kirk Jackson). The following interview includes excerpts from the longer interview that is available on http://www.beldonsbluespoint.blogspot.com/.

BBP: I did see you at the Hamilton (in DC, in November, 2012). I guess you were playing with Coco Montoya. I really enjoyed your show, I must sav.

Hammond: Thank you.

BBP: Well, why the blues, of the different styles of music you could have gotten into? What about them attracted you?

Hammond: When I was seven, my father took me to hear Big Bill Broonzy, who was one of the great country blues players. I was very impressed. I don't know how the seeds were sewn, but as I got older, I just sort of gravitated towards blues music and all of that passion and feeling, to me, it was where it all came from. I just got deeper and deeper into it. And when I was 18, I got a guitar, and when I was 19 I started playing professionally. It's all I wanted to do.

BBP: And I understand that you were a big fan of Jimmy Reed, that he had a lot of influence.

Hammond: Yeah. I got to be on a show with him. In 1964, in Oakland, CA. Yeah, I was opening the show. It was a show put on by a record producer named Chris Strachwitz who had a label called Arhoolie Records. And I got to know Chris. He's a big blues fanatic, and he put on shows, recorded artists and so forth. He is a terrific, dynamic guy.

BBP: And I also understand that you were a big fan of Robert Johnson. **Hammond:** I was, but I never met Robert Johnson (laughs). He died before I was born. But I got to know a lot of great blues players, including Howlin' Wolf and Muddy Waters. Willie Dixon. I could just name hundreds of other artists that I've toured with and played with—got to know and—I've had an amazing career.

BBP: Yeah, I've been reading all about you. You certainly have. Tell me about Willie Dixon though. I know that you were a friend of his.

Hammond: Well, he was happening on many levels. He was a songwriter of course, and wrote songs for Muddy and Howlin' Wolf and Little Walter and just about everybody. He was also a great bass player—

bandleader—he put artists on the map, you know from obscurity to having recording deals and so forth. He worked hand and glove with Chess Records and he took care of himself. I mean he got his songs published, he made money that way. He was a very happening guy. He was from Vicksburg, Mississippi. I'd driven through Vicksburg on my way to New Orleans once and I said "Oh, I was in your hometown, Vicksburg" and he said (imitating a very deliberate tone of voice) "don't talk to me about Vicksburg." Ooooh. So

I guess he didn't have wonderful experiences there. He had been a professional boxer for a while. He was a big, tough guy, but a really nice person.

BBP: A lot of musicians in the past I know were boxers. Jackie Wilson, the great R&B performer. A lot of folks. But you were described to me as the only person in the history of music who ever had Jimi Hendrix and Eric Clapton together in the same band.

Hammond: (laughs) For about a week, yeah.

BBP: How'd that happen?

Hammond: Well, I met Eric in 1965 when I was on tour in England. I hooked up on some shows with John Mayall and his Bluesbreakers, and Eric was his guitar player. So we hung out a bunch in England and played a bunch of shows together. They actually backed me on a TV show called Ready Steady Goes Live, and we became friends at that point. And in 1966 I was playing at a club in New York and was introduced to Jimi Hendrix, who was a fantastic guitar player and a great guy. I got to know him as a friend and I put a little band together with him as my lead guitar player and he was discovered and went over to England and became a huge star in Europe. In 1967 I put my own little band together, just drums and bass and Cream came over for their first tour in the U.S. and Hendrix came back to the U.S. from England, where he was a huge star. And they both had some time off, and they both came down to this club where I was playing with my little band. And they both said "Hey, suppose we sit in with you?" Every night that week they came in and sat in. It was just phenomenal.

BBP: How did they sound together? How was the mixture of...

Hammond: Oh, they were just incredible. They fed off each other; they were both great players, very passionate about blues music and—no problem.

BBP: But getting back to Jimi Hendrix, you actually advised him to—when Chas Chandler approached him—I think it was at the Café Go-Go in New York?

Hammond: The Café Au Go Go.

BBP: Right. You actually advised him to take Chas Chandler up on his offer.

Hammond: Oh, definitely. Oh yeah. He was so good. He was so dynamic, that how could you not suggest that he go over and make his own career happen? I mean he'd been a sideman for - for three or four years. He'd been with a band called Curtis Knight and was fired in New York, I think, for probably upstaging him (laughs). And I mean he was so dynamic, it was just incredible and he was a really, really nice guy.

BBP: Do you remember the conversation? His reaction?

Hammond: He said "Man, this guy has offered me a ticket to go to England and record." And I said: "You just have to do it. You're not going to have a whole lot of chances like that just off the bat." And he came back and looked me up when he'd already become a huge star.

BBP: I've heard you are a great electric player. Over the years, your trend seems to be to do acoustic shows, one man acoustic shows.

CD Review: James Cotton Cotton Mouth Man

Harp man James Cotton left home at the age of nine to move in with the legendary Sonny Boy Williamson II and learn the instrument from him. He first recorded in 1953 for Sam Phillips at Sun Records before Sam discovered Elvis and the other rockabillies, who brought him fame and some fortune. A year or so later, Muddy Waters came through Memphis without Junior Wells, his harp man, and he enlisted James to fill in. He liked what he heard. James moved with him to Chicago, where he was in Muddy's band for twelve years. James then went out on his own and has led bands for nearly half a century. He has released a variety of albums of varying quality. Throat cancer has robbed him of his ability to deliver his once-exuberant vocals, but he still is fully able to produce his extraordinary tone with the harmonica and lead an enthusiastic performance.

To enter James's seventh decade of recording, Alligator Records has enlisted producer/songwriter/drummer Tom Hambridge, who contributed much to making Buddy Guy's recent Living Proof album attractive to a wide range of listeners. Much of the Cotton Mouth Man CD is a celebration of James's life and career, with the artist co-writing some of the songs with Hambridge to tell his life story and some to just extol his overall blues essence. Darrell Nulisch, who currently sings in James's band, handles about half the vocals. A variety of guest stars are brought in to enliven the proceedings, with Keb Mo, Gregg Allman, Warren Haynes, Ruthie Foster, Delbert McClinton, and Joe Bonamassa each contributing vocals and/or guitar on a number or two. Chuck Leavell, who has backed the Allman Brothers and Rolling Stones among many others, handles the keyboards. It all works a lot better than many of these all-star sessions, as nobody seems to overplay their hand. It is sometimes a bit disconcerting to hear James's story told by somebody else and at other times he sounds like a sideman on his own album. But all that really can't be helped, and he is still able to weigh in with many passionate and powerful fills and short solos of his instantly recognizable harp work.

The songs are almost all written by Hambridge, sometimes with help from James or others. A number just tell James' tale, from plowing in Mississippi to Muddy's band to his brush with death at the hands of a crazy man. Some are just glorifications of wild and other types of women. They mostly tend to the up tempo and enthusiastic, even the biographical ones, as he truly is a survivor. On the closer "Bonnie Blue," James slowly rasps his way through part of his autobiography accompanied only by steel guitar, and it is a moving finish to these stories.


This is an enjoyable album celebrating one of the last of the first generation of Chicago bluesmen. Although somewhat slickly produced for maximum appeal, it succeeds and does not "talk down" to the listener. Let us hope there are more to come.

CD Review: Andy Poxon **Tomorrow**

I first became aware of Andy Poxon as a mid-teen guitar prodigy with a distinctive red-haired afro. Recently I saw him with DC area saxophonist Scott Ramminger, with whom he had shared a short tour and the two were playing songs from their respective recent releases. Listening critically, I was struck by the maturity Poxon displayed as a guitarist, singer, and songwriter. These qualities led Duke Robillard to produce Poxon's new Ellersoul records recording Tomorrow. On the CD notes, Duke observes that Andy "is a complete and mature musician at the ripe old age of 18." Further, Duke notes that how Andy arrived there was partially "derived from intense listening and research for the American traditions of blues, early R&B, classic country hillbilly, rockabilly, swing and jazz."

Tomorrow was recorded in Rhode Island under Duke's supervision with his band of Bruce Bear on keyboards, Brad Hallen on bass, and Mark Teixeira on drums, with Duke adding guitar, and horns from Rich Lataille, Mark Earley and Doug Wolverton. With the exception of the instrumental "Jammin' at Lakewest," co-written with Duke, Poxon composed all of the performances.

The music on this CD is quite enjoyable, as Andy has crafted songs that reflect his musical inspirations, with a definite pop slant perhaps. His natural singing shares the appeal of the lyrics with elements of blues and classic R&B (a definite New Orleans flavor can be heard on several songs including the lively "All By Myself"). Other songs reflect his youthful experiences such as "You Lied," where he caught her with him and finds his baby has lied to him from the start and tore his world apart, and "College Boy," with its rollicking groove as his baby left him for some old mean college boy. The title track is a lovely ballad with a hopeful lyric and nice trumpet from Woolverton.

In addition to his songs and vocals, Poxon's guitar playing stands out. With all these ear-splitting blues rock guitar prodigies being touted and promoted, it is refreshing to listen to Poxon's guitar. One can hear elements of rockabilly mixed in with his straight blues attack. His attack, tone, and the swing in his solos contrasts with the blues-rock of some of his contemporaries. A good case in point might be the closing "Jammin" at Lakewest." This is a jump blues instrumental feature for Poxon and Robillard, with swinging single note solos from both. It's certainly refreshing to hear a young guitarist who does take off from Stevie Ray Vaughan and channels such legends as Tiny Grimes, Al Casey, and Johnny Rogers.

It is tempting to talk about someone of Andy Poxon's age as a performer who exhibits considerable promise and how interesting it will be to see how his music evolves. It must be stated that Tomorrow is a choice recording of blues and roots that stands on its own considerable merits.

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Up Close & Personal w/ John Hammond - Cont. from p. 7

Hammond: Yes, that's what I enjoy doing most. I can play some electric guitar but that isn't my real focus. I prefer the solo style that I've developed over all of these years and I feel that's my strongest point. I do enjoy playing the electric guitar, but having a band together and all of that, that's not been my focus.

BBP: But you have done some albums where you've played electric. The one you recorded with David Hidalgo from Los Lobos. How do you know when something calls for a band and when something calls for you to

Hammond: Usually it's the record label that says, "Well, we don't want a solo record." So it's kind of on my shoulders to put a band together. What I like to do and have done in the past is to do some cuts on the album as a solo and some with just a piano or a smaller combo, and then some with a full band; you know drums, bass, piano, whatever. And I've made albums in the past with big bands and horn sections and all of that stuff. I've had a chance to do a lot of stuff over the years.

BBP: Yeah, I kind of picked that up. One thing though. You don't really do a lot of original material, do you?

Hammond: I've got some songs of my own, yeah... I don't think of myself as a songwriter. I'm a blues singer and I know hundreds and hundreds of songs so I have a lot to fall back on, be inspired by.

BBP: But it seems like your aim seems to be to kind of pay tribute and homage to the genre.

Hammond: I do songs that I like. I'm definitely in the genre. This is my life. I think that blues music is always relevant and dynamic-very honest-and I've been inspired to do this for my whole career. A great song

deserves to be sung, and I don't think you have to be a songwriter to be a good singer or player.

BBP: You know something else I was curious about? I've seen a lot of people do this-Bruce Springsteen-you did it at your show at the Hamilton. Playing the harmonica and playing the guitar at the same time. That must be very hard.

Hammond: Well, it isn't anymore. It used to be like a huge challenge right at the beginning, but I began playing harmonica and guitar almost at the same time. So in order to put them together, I guess it's like a piano player that has a left hand independent from the right hand. And after a while, you don't even think about it: it just flows. It's hard to put in the words. Yes, that's what I've started out to do and got to a point where I could do it and was encouraged to do it and felt like I was getting better. Well, there's only a handful of players that play on the rack like I do. Jimmy Reed was one. I don't know if you ever saw Doc Watson play... Great harmonica player "on the rack" (which leaves your hands free to play guitar). It's uh...you have to be a little nuts to do it, I think (laughs).

The Tinner Hill Blues Festival is held annually in Falls Church, VA, to honor blues guitarist John Jackson, who lived in Virginia and died in 2002. Scheduled for June 7-9, 2013, this year's Festival will also feature singer/guitarist Big Bill Morganfield, vocalist Sista Monica, Beverly "Guitar" Watkins, guitarist Roy Book Binder, pianist Daryl Davis, vocalist Mary Ann Redmond, The Acoustic Blues Women, Sheryl Warner & the Southside Housewreckers, among others.
