The Daddy Mack Blues Band plays authentic Memphis blues and has a reputation for being a great band for cutting' loose on a Saturday night. Led by Mack Orr on lead guitar/vocals, this four-piece group first played at a February 25, 2012 DC Blues Society show that drew an appreciative standing room only crowd.

From barbecue dives in Mississippi to the Chicago Blues Festival, to Paris, France, Daddy Mack has "been

there done that." Not bad for a guy who didn't begin playing the guitar until he was about 45 years old. When he picked up the guitar, he practiced whenever he could and within three years was playing gigs around Memphis. Years later, he has performed at numerous festivals, jammed with Keith Richards and Ron Woods of the Rolling Stones, and recorded five CDs. See p. 5 for an interview with Daddy Mack.



The Stacy Brooks Band won the DC Blues Society 2013 Battle of the Bands, beating out eight other bands. With this win, the Band will be competing in the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, in January 2014. The Band has been touring steadily since being formed in 2007. Stacy's style is heavily influenced by Chicago Blues, and she has shared the stage with Chicago blues legends Billy Branch, Eddie Shaw, and Sugar Blue, to name a few. Stacy's award-nominated CD, Love, Peace & The Blues, boasts a duet with Blues Music

Award winner Kenny Neal, and she wrote and arranged 12 of the 14 songs on the CD. The musicians in her band are Walter Tates Jr. (sax), Jeremy Boyle (guitar), Barry Brady (guitar), Charles Adkins (bass), and Calvin Newbill Jr. (drums). The music they make, plus Stacy's dynamic vocals, will have you wanting more and hooked on their groove.

Little Bit A Blues is a DC favorite and combines Warner Williams' warm vocals and Piedmont guitar picking with Jay Summerour's harmonica. Warner, a native of Takoma Park, MD., has been part of Washington's blues scene since the '50s. Jay is a veteran of the Starland Vocal Band and the Cambridge Harmonica Orchestra. The pair has played festivals and concerts across the country.

Individually and as a group, they have received numerous awards. In 2012, Jay received a WAMMIE Lifetime Achievement Award and 83-year-old Warner Williams was inducted by the National Endowment of the Arts as a Lifetime Heritage Fellow for his contribution to American music. In the Fall of 2012, Little Bit A Blues completed a live recording at SiriusXM Studios, and released the CD, *The Best of Little Bit A Blues: Live at B.B. King's Bluesville (Soul StewRecords).*



The DC Blues Society Band, an offshoot of the DC Blues Society, was formed in 2010 with the intent of promoting and preserving the genre of blues in the Washington, DC area. This "high energy" band consists of Dr. Ayaba Bey (vocals), Dave Harris (harmonica), Sam'i Nuriddin (guitar), Joe "E-Flat" Thomas (saxophone), Dave Jackson (bass), and Calvin Newbill, Jr. (drums). The band plays a mix of danceable blues tunes with a heavy tip of the hat to typical blues standards. With the

leadership of Dr. Bey, the DC Blues Society Band prides itself on being a tight organization that is sure to be entertaining.





An Interview with Daddy Mack

As the date for the College Park Blues Festival was approaching, DCBS volunteer Joseph Assante had the opportunity to talk with Daddy Mack, the headliner for the Festival, and to dig a little into what makes this Bluesman tick. Joe's interview for the Capital Blues Messenger (CBM) appears below and continues on p. 10:

CBM: When did you start playing the blues? Who were your major influences? Daddy Mack: I started listening to the blues around 14 years old. I was living on a plantation. There was another young man who knew a few songs and we used to



frequent the juke joints together. I liked B.B. King, Albert King, and Muddy Waters. After my marriage, I got away from all that. Then one day, I was sitting in my garage (Mack's Auto Repair) and heard an Albert King song come on the radio and I decided to go to the pawn shop and start it all up again from there. I was 45. Even though I was working, I had a lot of free time to practice. I brought it (my guitar) fishing, even. People would say. "Your fingers won't work that fast." Honestly, I never dreamed that success would be like

CBM: Are you still working (as a mechanic)? Daddy Mack: When I get back in (to Memphis), I work at the shop for a week or two and hit the road again. I'm always trying to move around and make a dollar. Continued on p. 10

The Annual DCBS Battle of the Bands usually provides some fierce competition as local bands vie for the opportunity to represent DCBS at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, TN. The October 12, 2013 Battle was especially competitive as there were nine bands registered and they all showed up to play. And play they did. The show started promptly at 7 p.m., and each band played a tight 25-minute set, with 10 minutes allowed for the transition to the next band. Thanks to the Battle coordinator, the volunteers, and the bands themselves, the show went off without a hitch.

Congratulations goes to the Stacy Brooks Band (photo at right), which took first place in the competition. Stacy's band was also the first act on the schedule, and her opening song "Wang Dang Doodle" got the house jumping and set the stage for her Chicago style of blues.

DC Blues Society Brings a Winning Band to Town


On Sunday, October 6, the DC Blues Society presented the Selwyn Birchwood Band, from Tampa, FL, at the Silver Spring American Legion. While this band may not be known now to many people, they have generated a lot of attention and made lots of new fans since winning the 2013 International Blues Challenge (IBC). At the IBC, they only had to beat 240 other bands, and on top of that, Selwyn also won the Albert King Award

for Best Guitarist! With that kind of background, an enthusiastic crowd came out for the DCBS show and witnessed an event that demonstrated why this band is one of the best new blues band touring today.

Arriving in Silver Spring after driving 8 hours from a show in Buffalo, NY, the band put on one of the most entertaining, high energy performances that I have seen in this area in a long time and quickly won over the audience after the first few songs. Playing many original songs from their first CD (a 2nd CD will be out later this year) and a few covers, the band features the incredible guitar and vocals of Selwyn and baritone sax player Regi Oliver. The rhythm section is anchored by Huff Wright on 5-string bass and Curtis Nutall on drums, who kept the groove going all night. Playing what Selwyn said was a mix of Florida swamp, Chicago, New Orleans, Swing/shuffles, and old school styles of blues, the band mixed it up and kept the dance floor full of a very happy and appreciative crowd. Sitting down in a chair for a few songs, Selwyn kicked off his shoes to play some "old school" shuffles and great slide guitar. When the band played the Muddy Waters song "She's 19 Years Old," he brought the house down with some virtuoso guitar playing that showed why he won the Albert King Guitar Award

> and inspired vocals that Muddy would be proud of. Selwyn and Sax man Regi Oliver walked





The Selwyn Birchwood Band has traveled more than 35,000 miles since winning the 2013 IBC. I'm sure the band will be traveling many more miles in 2014 as they continue to get more national exposure - including being on the January 2014 Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise - and as they win over more audiences who will spread the news about their talents and their brand of "swampy Florida blues!" Greg Allman, Bono, Clarence Carter, Mick Jagger, Etta James, Alicia Keys, Keith Richards, Percy Sledge and others bear witness to Muscle Shoals' magnetism, mystery and why it remains influential today. Michael O'Sullivan's review of the movie for The Washington Post called it "a mesmerizing documentary,... This colorblind recording history is fascinating."

Interview with Daddy Mack (Continued from p. 5)

CBM: Are you still playing in the house band at the Center for Southern Folklore in Memphis?

Daddy Mack: Yes, I actually played there last night. I used to play there every week, but it's been a while. I haven't been all over the world but I've seen a lot of places, places that I wouldn't have dreamed of seeing - Montana, Idaho, Canada, Iowa, Minnesota, Texas, and Vegas. It's kind of unbelievable. Everything hit me when I got old. Better late than never, though. Like I got started late, but I always look at it like that.

I'm looking forward to DC. Hoping everybody comes out. We are going to play some blues.

CBM: What else are you looking forward to in the future?

Daddy Mack: I have got the new album out and it's called *Pay the Piper*. We are supposed to go back in the studio pretty soon, but, like I said, this year is better than any year ever.

CBM: What kind of gear are you using?

Daddy Mack: Peavey amp and guitar. I like the sound I can get out of that Peavey amp and guitar.

CBM: What are your goals? Any places that you "must" travel to? know you said the blues has already taken you to so many places.

Daddy Mack: I have been to New York City, even got a chance to go to Times Square and the Empire State building. I have seen a lot of places. I do repeat them a lot of the times, but I am still excited (to go there). A lot of people accept the blues more. I have seen a lot of places on the road.,, I am recognized more when I'm on the road more than I am in Memphis.

CBM: What's your outlook for blues music? What are your positive and negative criticisms? Any thoughts on the young blues players out there?

Daddy Mack: A lot of people are saying they're playing the blues, but they are not really playing the blues. They are mixing rock and whatever else. People tell me this is what I want to hear when I play. They'll be walking (by), and a lot come and say, "This is what we want to hear! This is blues."

I'm a bluesman. You might buy a Cadillac, a GM, or a Ford, you know? I play some different stuff. Some people dance to faster music, slow music, so I kind of mix it up but I play the blues. We went to Edmonton, Canada and I played a week there. Everybody enjoyed it. Like I've said, we played some places that have other music, festivals, etc. Sometimes we sit there and listen, and we say," That ain't blues." Lowdown dirty blues, that's what I like.

Miscellaneous Blues News

- Congratulations to the Joy Bodycomb Band for the release of its new CD, Just Livin'. The CD release party was held on Sun., Oct. 20 at Dave and Busters in Rockville, MD.
- Tom Principato rolls out his new CD at a CD release party on Sat., Nov. 16 at the Bethesda Blues & Jazz Supper Club. Principato will be joined by full band accompaniment as well as special guest appearances by Tommy Lepson (keyboards/vocals), Joe Wells (drums), Josh Howell (percussion, vocals, harmonica), Jay Turner (bass), Bob Shellhouse (2nd guitar), and a 3-piece horn section led by John DeSalme (baritone sax), Justine Miller (trumpet), and Xavier Perez (tenor sax). Shacara Rogers, Rochelle Rice, and Imani-Grace Cooper from Howard University's Afro Blue Vocal Group will be on background vocals.
- On Fri., Nov. 15, George Mason University's Center for the Arts, in Fairfax, VA, will host the "World Blues" tour, which celebrates the global impact of blues music, and features the Taj Mahal Trio; African singer, poet-activist Vusi Mahlasela; and Fredericks Brown (Mahal's daughter and her band). This performance brings together the influences of Harlem, South Africa, and New Zealand in the forms of blues, R&B, soul, jazz, world, and roots music.

CBM: Does your family support your blues career? Has anyone else in your family started playing?

Daddy Mack: No, haven't gotten anybody in the family playing the blues. A lot of people told me, "you're not going to learn how to play that guitar." The criticism helps. You don't like it back then, but sometimes you think they might have done you good. When people criticize you, you are going to try that much harder to prove them wrong. You don't like it back then of course, but at the same time, it's helping you when people criticize you and doubt you. You are going to try that much harder and that helps. It kind of made me angry. It made me try harder.

I hear a lot of people saying, "I can't do it, I can't do it" (about playing guitar). I say you can do just about anything if you put your mind to it. You have to stay with it and play it every day. So the next time and the next time you can go a little further. Just lying in bed last night with the guitar I was just thinking about my playing. It's like working on a car. Thinking about it in bed, what's wrong with it, and then the next day, try it again. Take a break, think about it and come back to it again. Once you get frustrated, you just need to leave it alone and come back.

CBM: Are you the only vocalist in your band?

Daddy Mack: I do all the singing and the other guitar player, he sings some, also - two or three songs.

CBM: How did you meet your bandmates?

Daddy Mack: I was playing in a band and they started going down, and so I put a new one together.

CBM: What year?
Daddy Mack: Late '80s

CBM: Do you plan on staying in Memphis?

Daddy Mack: Yes, I kind of like where I'm at. I've been there for 40 years.

CBM: Anything you would like say?

Daddy Mack: I can't think of nothing else, other than that I am excited to do this event (in DC), and we'll have plenty of CDs there. We are always looking forward to DC and we just hope everybody comes out.
