With the popularity of motorcycle ownership on the rise, the D.C. Blues Society has decided to join the links of Blues and Bikes. At our annual July 14th Fish Fry & Blues Jam, we will hold our FIRST ANNUAL BIKE SHOW, Saturday, July 14th at Chick Hall's Surf Club (4711 Kenilworth Ave., Bladensburg, MD.) Admission is \$12, which includes a fish sandwich, one draft beer/soda, blues all nite, and a vote for the winning bike.

The music begins at 4:30 p.m. with a Pre-arranged Open Mike Blues Jam featuring great local artists



Blues Bits

Roy Buchanan

Roy Buchannan reportedly said that he first got into black music while attending Gospel-filled, racially-mixed revival meetings in California. Eventually, he became noted for his note-bending, staccato runs, and pinch harmonics technique, as well as for being a pioneer of the Telecaster sound.

In 1957, Buchanan made his recording debut, playing the solo on the Blues-inflected swamp rock-boogie sound of Dale Hawkins' "My Babe" for Chicago's Chess Records.

Buchannan settled in the Washington, DC area in the mid-60's playing as a sideman and starting his own groups. In 1971, riding on word-of-mouth reputation he gained national notoriety as the result of an hour-long Public broadcasting TV documentary, entitled "The Best Unknown Guitarist In The World." The show revived his recording career and began a decade of national and international touring. He recorded a total of eight albums & earned two gold records.

Buchanan quit recording in 1981, vowing never to enter a studio again unless he could do music his own way. Alligator Records coaxed him back into the studio where his first album stayed on Billboard's pop charts for 13 weeks. His third and last album featured veteran soul singer **Johnny Sayles** and blues singer **Kanika Kress**. In Reston, VA, a domestic dispute fueled by long-standing alcohol and substance problems, led to his wife calling the police. Several hours after being arrested, Buchanan was found hanged in his cell. His death on August 14, 1988 at the age of 49 was ruled a suicide.





Blues Reviews

Matt Wigler XII [Thirteen] (Vista)



It is difficult to review "Child Prodigies" because they make it so hard to take the kid gloves off. Sometimes just the astonishment of someone so young accomplishing so much can hamper objectivity (sure, he can play **Hoagy Carmichael** at 13, but can he play it with feeling?) In addition, I worry that a youngster is still too green to

be thick-skinned enough in putting up with the often uninformed and erroneous self-important ravings of your average music critic?

Happily, none of these doubts clouded **Matt Wigler's** *Thirteen* (named, I presume, after this wunderkind's age at recording time.) That tween can play boogie-woogie keyboards like nobody alive! And thankfully, his producer **Deanna Bogart** knows how to bring out the best in him and his band. Her saxophone is also a tight thread that sews together this album beautifully.

However, I believe Wigler's genius really comes out of his creativity. The original compositions on this album far outshine the covers, which occasionally veer into muzak territory. But who can fault a kid who hasn't yet learned to keenly interpret the depths of a form that is evolving into classical stature?

Personally, I am eagerly anticipating seeing him jam for the first time. Matt will be sitting in on a few sessions at DCBS's upcoming *Fish Fry & Jam* on July 14th at the Surf Club, where I hope to put my ears as close as possible to his speakers.

ACME Blues Company I Think I Made It (Stony Plain)



An often overlooked sub-genre of Blues is the East-Coast variety. Great contributors like Jersey's **Asbury Jukes** and Boston's **J. Geil's Band** get poo-pooed or worse, dismissed. Perhaps it is because East Coast culture is closer to London than Memphis, 'Tis a pity because so few combos get to climb out of regional recognition—as the **Nighthawks** or

NRBQ did. But as surely as air passes through a Hohner, local boys **ACME Blues Company** deserve international fame.

Have they made it? I think so here. They've put together a thick, crunchy compilation reminiscent of their hard-core late-night jams and blams.


One of the best things about East Coast Blues, I think, is a sort of self-deprecating modesty—setting aside ego in favor of pushing out the best sound possible for each particular song. This is where I Think I Made It really shines: Each member of the band is perhaps one of the best with his particular instrument, but together they know that sometimes a session needs the extra punch that guest musicians can make, or even the occasional extemporized babble.

I Think I Made It is a gritty, grinding piece of hard-core urban Blues. It makes it... Thanks for an awesome album, guys!

DVD Review:

Born in the Honey: The Pinetop Perkins Story (Vizztone Label Group and Sagebrush Productions)



I've found the perfect birthday or holiday gift for blues fans in your family, contacts in your MySpace or Outlook networks, or DC Blues Society regulars down at Chick Hall's Surf Club. It's Born in the Honey, a documentary of Pinetop Perkins with a bonus CD, Pinetop Perkins Live on the 88s, recorded in Chicago. The CD features a previously unreleased "Rather Quit Her Than Hit Her," and the rest of the set features Pinetop with the classic Chicago blues engine room of Willie "Big Eyes" Smith on

drums and **Bob "Have Bass Will Travel" Stroger** on bass, and **"Little Frank" Krokowski** on guitar.

We get to know Pinetop through 60 minutes of live performances, interviews, historical footage dating back to the 40's, and commentaries from a who's who in the blues, including Paul Oscher, Ann Rabson, Dr. John, Hubert Sumlin, Marcia Ball, Sam Carr, Mitch Woods, and one of Pinetop's protégées, **Ike Turner**. Along the way, we learn about the hardships Pinetop faced as a youngster on the Honey Plantation in Belzoni, Mississippi. He virtually raised himself after his parents split up, and one of the DVD's more touching moments is a close-up of his mother's headstone in a neglected cemetery. Vintage photographs chronicle Pinetop's early years with Robert Nighthawk, Earl Hooker, Sonny Boy Williamson (Rice Miller), and the daily 15-minute dose of live Delta blues on KFFA Radio, King Biscuit Time. Pinetop's had a hard life, and he probably shouldn't have messed around with that chorus girl who cut his left arm to the tendon in a dispute that also involved her husband. Keeping the Blues Alive Award winner **Bubba Sullivan** recounts Pinetop's late-night rescue in Helena—don't forget that segregation blocked black America's access to healthcare and essential ER services. Pinetop's arm was fixed largely because the radio station didn't want a one-armed bluesman

on the air. Fortunately, his left arm was patched up. While that incident ended Pinetop's career as a guitarist, it pointed him toward the piano. He's been at the 88s ever since.

This is the first video I have ever seen that caused the great blues entertainer **Bobby Rush** to blush. If you've seen Bobby Rush's bawdy live shows, then you know it would take a lot to make Mr. Rush blush. Bobby's recollections of some pretty questionable post-gig hijinks are simply delightful. Bobby promised he'd keep that story about the transvestite a secret, but it's right here on Born in the Honey.

Born in the Honey features Pinetop playing with Calvin "Fuzz" Jones, Willie "Big Eyes" Smith, "Steady Rollin" Bob Margolin, and Mookie Brill at the former King Biscuit Blues Festival. International Blues Challenge winner and Blues Music Awards nominee Diunna Greenleaf does a star turn to get Pinetop's mojo working. The DVD offers a nice balance of live performances and Ken Burns-style interviews to hold viewers' interests. My favorite scenes feature Pinetop reflecting on his life on the front porch at the Hopson Plantation near Clarksdale, Mississippi.

Get Born in the Honey for your friends and fellow blues fans. More importantly, don't forget to get one for your own blues library, 'cause it's a classic.
