Selwyn Birchwod Dazzles DCBS at St. Patrick's Day Performance

"There's a blues party in here tonight," declared Selwyn Birchwood shortly after taking the stage. The guitar ace told the sold-out DCBS audience that he had no safety net for the evening's performance, the music would be generated by raw emotion and feelings. And he delivered on that promise with lots of laughs and in his bare feet.

Birchwood and his band shared an intense and wide-ranging St. Patrick's Day show with blues fans at American Legion Post 41 in Silver Spring, MD. "We're all-original, we don't sound like anyone else," he said. With a baritone sax wailing and his tight band behind him, Birchwood demonstrated effortless guitar playing, as the music flowed from his fingertips without the need for any apparent thought. His lanky body was in sync with his

music, as he jumped, danced and bounced around the stage in his bare feet, shaking his oversized Afro and flashing a wide, engaging grin.

Since winning the 2013 International Blues Challenge and the Albert King Guitarist of the Year Award, Birchwood released two albums, *Don't Call No Ambulance* in 2014 and *Pick Your Poison* in 2018. He said he's been to 15 countries in the past six years and, now in his early 30s, he's sitting on top of the blues world.

During the show, Birchwood musically travelled the history of the blues. A talented impersonator, he good-naturedly mimicked legends John Lee Hooker, T-Model Ford, Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and others, playing in their styles and capturing their voices. "Deep in my heart, I don't

2019 Inductees to Blues Hall of Fame

The Blues Hall of Fame honors those who have made the Blues timeless through performance, documentation, and recording. Members are inducted in five categories: Performers, Individuals, Classic of Blues Literature, Classic of Blues Recording (Song), and Classic of Blues Recording (Album).

Since 1980, The Blues Foundation has inducted 400+ industry professionals, recordings, and literature into the Blues Hall of Fame. Candidates are determined exclusively on their bodies of work over their lifetimes. The 2019 Induction Ceremony is set for Thursday, May 8, the evening before The Blues Music Awards.

Performers:

Aretha Franklin was often viewed as the Queen of Soul; however she also was recognized as the Queen of the Blues, as well as gospel royalty. Her powerful vocal range, striking intimacy, and impeccable timing made her one of the greatest singers ever. After signing with Columbia, her first release was "Today I Sing the Blues." At Atlantic Records, she scored many hits



which entered the repertoires of blues and soul bands, including "Dr. Feelgood," the second side of "Respect." Franklin, who died in 2018, garnered more than 20 Grammys, along with the Kennedy Center Honors, the NAACP Vanguard and Hall of Fame awards, and induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Booker T. & the MGs

presented the soulful sound of Memphis, playing behind the stars at Stax Records, while making their own instrumental hits. Their first record in 1962, "Green Onions," was followed by 14 more chart hits.

The original group comprised Booker T. Jones (organ), Steve Cropper (guitar), Lewie Steinberg (bass), and Al Jackson, Jr. (drums). Donald "Duck" Dunn took over on bass later. They also were an integrated band, which was rare then, particularly in the South. "Green Onions" was inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2018.



William James "Count" Basie and his sound were forever linked to Kansas City, a freewheeling crossroads that was a hotbed for both jazz and blues. "The King of Swing," Basie created music rooted

in the blues. He played blues piano with an easy, economical touch; wrote or revamped an impressive cache of blues and jump tunes; and employed acclaimed vocalists who could sing the blues, such as Jimmy Rushing, Billie Holiday, and Joe Williams.

Ida Cox was touted as the "Uncrowned Queen of the Blues" from the start of her recording career in 1923. Although Ma Rainey and Bessie Smith are considered the top stars of the vaudeville blues era, Cox was every bit their rival. A high-class entertainer who dressed in the finest gowns, Cox also was a composer of note. Her "Wild Women Don't Have the Blues" has become a feminist anthem, while other titles and verses of hers have resurfaced in the work of legendary bluesmen, including "Mojo Hand" (Lightnin' Hopkins) and "I Am So Glad" (Skip James). Cox passed away in 1967.




Connie Curtis "Pee Wee" Crayton was a California transplant. With guidance from T-Bone Walker and jazz guitarist John Collins, Crayton developed his own guitar style, incorporating their sophistication but picking with a harder edge. One of West Coast blues' brightest stars, Crayton reached No. 1 in 1948 on BILLBOARD's R&B chart with "Blues After Hours," the only instrumental credited to a guitarist ever to top the R&B charts. Crayton displayed a dynamic flair on



later records, and his guitar battles with longtime friend T-Bone Walker always made headlines. Crayton died in 1985.

Classic Blues Album

Elmore James: *The Sky is Crying* is the other James recording being honored with a Blues Hall of Fame induction this year. James died in 1963 and did not live to see the release of this 1965 compilation, the first U.S. album to collect sides he recorded for Bobby Robinson from 1959-1961. Seven of the 12 tracks on this classic collection were first issued as singles on Robinson's Fire label, including a remake of his signature song, "Dust My Broom."



Classic Blues Songs

"Everyday I Have the Blues" is one of the most ubiquitous blues tunes. B.B. King is most associated with the tune, and so the first of his own many versions gets the honor.

"I Got a Woman" by Ray Charles perfectly illustrates the way Charles transformed the sacred into the secular.

"Rollin' Stone" by Muddy Waters was the first blues record issued by Chess. It also is the only track Muddy sang and played by himself.

"Shake Your Money Maker" by Elmore James was recorded in 1961 and marked an exuberant departure from his deep blues recordings.

"The St. Louis Blues" is one of the most recorded songs of all time. Few versions of the W.C. Handy tune can compare with that of Bessie Smith's 1925 Columbia single.

Individual

Moses "Moe" Asch is a preeminent figure in the history of folk music, thanks to his release of 2000+ albums on Folkways Records, as well as on Asch, Disc and other labels. Folkway's blues roster included Lead Belly, Elizabeth Cotten, Reverend Gary Davis, Memphis Slim, and Big Joe Williams.

Classic Blues Literature

LOST DELTA FOUND: REDISCOVERING THE FISK UNIVERSITY-LIBRARY OF CONGRESS COAHOMA COUNTY STUDY, 1941-1942 was first planned for publication in the 1940s. The original manuscript was submitted to the Library of Congress but was misplaced for decades. This 2005 Vanderbilt University Press publication is edited by Robert Gordon and Bruce Nemerov.



2019 Local + Nearby Blues Festivals — Make Your Plans Now!

It's once again time to start thinking about which blues festivals you might attend this year. From late Spring through early Fall, the DC area and surrounding states host many blues and other music festivals. This annual guide is intended to help DC-area blues fans plan their weekends and trips to include some great festivals that support the blues. Several festivals are also fundraisers for charities.

The DC Blues Society is especially pleased to be able to produce the 30th Annual DC Blues Festival this year. For the second year, the DC Blues Festival will be held at the Wunder Garten, 1101 First St., NE, Washington, DC on Sunday, Oct. 13. The Festival has been moved to Columbus Day weekend to avoid the scorching heat of last year's Festival. Once again, this will remain a free Festival, and DCBS welcomes sponsors and donations. The Wunder Garten will be selling their outstanding craft beers and other drink options, and a food truck will be onsite. For those wondering about the change in venue, the Carter Barron Amphitheatre remains closed pending construction to fix structural issues with the stage.

The Chesapeake Bay Blues Festival (CBBF) is taking a break this year. The CBBF promoter made this announcement after last year's mud-heavy Festival, saying "Primarily, we felt that we need to take a year off to evaluate the changing conditions in the outdoor concert world."

Similarly, the Western Maryland Blues Fest is taking a one-year hiatus, due to construction in the downtown Hagerstown area; however, another organization has stepped up and will host an alternative festival, the

Interstate Brews & Blues Fest, at Washington County Agricultural Education Center in Boonsboro, MD.

And more good news — the Bluebird Blues Festival returns this year on Sept. 28 on the grounds of the Prince George's Community College, and The Music Café in Damascus is hosting a new festival, the Big Funky Blues Festival, on Father's Day, Sunday, June 16.

The Tinner Hill Festival returns for its 26th year, as a "re-branded, re-styled, and expanded music festival celebrating many genres of music on the main stage and interactive villages throughout the Festival Experience."

Mark your calendars now for some of the great festivals included in this guide. Visit the individual festival websites to see the line-up of performers. Some festivals are free; others have admission fees and offer early bird and/or advance ticket sales.

Band of Friends Celebrates Rory Gallagher at the City Winery

The award-winning trio “Band of Friends: A Celebration of Rory Gallagher” rocked the City Winery DC on March 15. This is the Friends’ third US tour in less than a year, and the band is led by Rory Gallagher’s former bassist, Gerry McAvoy who played on all 14 of Rory’s solo albums, and rising blues-rock star Davy Knowles on guitar. Mike Hansen is filling in on drums for Ted McKenna, Gallagher’s former drummer who recently passed away.

If you are not familiar with Rory Gallagher, the Irish guitarist shared the stage with Jimi Hendrix, Cream, and The Who; toured all over the world; and turned down offers to join the Rolling Stones. He is listed 57th on ROLLING STONE magazine’s list of “100 Greatest Guitarists of All Time.”

Sadly, Rory passed away in 1995 at the age of 47. But his music lives on. Gerry stresses Band of Friends is not a tribute band. “The interpretations of the material can be quite spontaneous and unique,” he said. “It’s not a note-for-note replica of Rory’s material or concerts from decades past, but his influence and spirit are omnipresent in everything we do.”

I sat down with Gerry and Davy before the show for an exclusive talk about the tour and about Rory.

DCBS: “Gerry, when did you decide to start the Band of Friends?”

Gerry: “I had moved to France and in around 2012, I started listening to all of my vinyl and a lot of it was Rory. I had forgotten how good those songs were. There are some great songs, and they hadn’t been played in a while. I thought they should be done again with the right people. I contacted Ted, and he was up for it. I got Marcel Scherpenzeel in Holland, and he was up for it. Then I got in touch with Davy in the States and he was up for it. It’s been snowballing since then.”

DCBS: Davy, I saw you on the Joe Bonamassa cruise recently and at one

show, almost everyone was holding a drum “sticks for Ted.” That was a powerful, emotional show. Do you know who gave out the drum sticks?”

Davy: Yes that was very emotional. A friend of mine and a fan of the band and Ted bought a load of them and wanted to do something nice. I didn’t know he was going to do it. It was overwhelming and emotional to see it. Then at the first show on this tour, the same guy came back with a load of drum sticks.”

DCBS: “I never saw Rory but watching videos and seeing Davy play, I see there are a lot of similarities in playing styles.”

Gerry: “Davy comes from the same place as Rory. We listened to the same music I listened to growing up, love the blues. He has the same passion, the same drive that Rory had.”

DCBS: “What guitar and amp do you use?”

Davy: “For my band, a 66 Tele is my main guitar. Fender made a copy of Rory’s famous, iconic strat. Have to use a strat for Rory’s music. It was a part of him; just the right thing to do. I use a 1976 Vox AC 30 amp.”

DCBS: “Gerry, what do you play?”

Gerry: “I use a 63 Fender P-bass. I bought it in San Francisco in ‘75 or ‘76. Got a lot of others including an old Silvertone bass that I recorded with Rory.”

DCBS: “Who influenced you when you started? Remember seeing any special shows?”

Davy: “Growing up on the Isle of Man, 30 or 40 miles from Ireland, Rory was king! He had a Celtic

The show started with a rocking’ version of “Messing with the Kid.” Gerry doesn’t stand still much on stage, smiling, directing the band and encouraging the audience to clap and cheer on the band. When Gerry asked, “Do you want to hear some blues?” the crowd screamed and yelled again, and Davy followed with a tour-de-force solo. Davy has mastered an amazing technique using his right-hand fingers to adjust the volume and tone knobs while playing notes with his left hand. It’s a very tricky, complex thing to try.

Next they played a very emotional, slow blues song, “A Million Miles Away” as a tribute to their friend Ted McKenna, followed by “Shadowsplay” with Davy’s outrageous guitar bringing the crowd to a frenzy. For an encore, Gerry invited everyone to stand up front and around edges of the stage. The band did a powerful version of “Bullfrog Blues,” a trademark song of Gallagher’s. What a night! A Band Make sure you see Band of Friends the next time they’re in town.

flair. I heard a lot of Celtic growing up, and he was very relatable to us. I started playing because of Mark Knopfler; I wanted to be Mark Knopfler, even had a headband (everyone laughs). He inspired me to start.”

Gerry: “I grew up with the Shadows; Jet Harris was my idol at the time. Paul McCartney was a major influence; so melodic. So were Willie Dixon and Jaco Pastorius. I did see John Mayall’s Blues Band and Cream. Van Morrison had a club and he brought in a lot of British Bands.”

Davy: “Where I grew up was isolated but my father took me to Belfast now and then. He was a big music fan, and I saw Eric Clapton, John Mayall, Mark Knopfler and Stan Webb’s Chicken Shack blues band.

DCBS: Thanks for taking time to meet before your show tonight.

want these guys to be forgotten,” he said. “The blues is such a cool form of music. I connect to their stories and that lets me reach the music at a higher level.”

Birchwood said he liked to “conjure up spirits” and talked about Muddy Waters’ classic “Whiskey

Blues.” Acknowledging Waters’ inspiration, he moved into “Guilty Pleasures” from the *Pick Your Poison* CD. The audience was so reverent and quiet that you could have heard a pin drop.

The second set was time for “getting funky,” and Birchwood started with the CD’s cover song “Pick Your Poison.” In recognition of St. Patrick’s Day, he laughed slyly, then pulled on an oversized leprechun hat with a blond beard attached.

Birchwood continued the musical history lesson, showing off different styles of finger picking on his electrified acoustic guitar. The audience was transfixed at his version of the 19th-century standard, “Make Me a Pallet on Your Floor,” using Carolina-style picking. Introducing the influence of Gospel music with profanity, Birchwood said he likes to curse before playing Gospel songs. “That way you go wrong and then get right.”

Taking a seat and holding his lap steel guitar, Birchwood was in his element. He moved into “When the Saints Go Marching In,” using his exacting style to coax rich, lengthy tones that

delighted the appreciative audience.

No blues show would be complete without paying respects to B.B. King, and Birchwood appropriately obliged by ending the show with “I’m a Blues Man But I’m a Good Man.”

Preceding Birchwood, local guitar icon Clarence “The Blues Man” Turner revved up the audience with a set of original and cover songs. Turner quickly filled the dance floor with the first chords of Willie Dixon’s “I’m Ready for You” and Ray Charles’ “Black Jack” from his most recent CD, *The Caster Blaster*. Much to the delight of the crowd, Turner and his five-piece band highlighted their original songs, including “Pay Day,” “I’m a Happily Married Man” and “Mojo Hand.”
