Good Luck to DCBS Reps, Others Competing at IBC!

Five days of music and music competition take over Memphis for the 34th International Blues Challenge (IBC), Jan. 16–20. The Beale Street Historic District of Memphis comes alive with performances from (at last count) 108 bands, 92 solo/duo acts and 29 Youth Showcase entries.

DCBS is proud to sponsor two strong entries in the 2018 IBC.

Band Category: Lady D & The Rogue Johnsen Trio Solo/Duo Competition: Patty Reese & Dave Chappell

on sax, and drummer Earl Ivey. Lady D and the Rogue Johnsen Trio came together as a band only recently and won the DC Blues Society 2017 Battle of the Bands.

Individually, these musicians have dedicated their lives passionately to music and their personal accomplishments are extensive.

Lady D is known as West Virginia's First Lady of Soul. She is an actress, songwriter, director and promoter; and has toured her one-woman

show, a musical stage play based on the life and music of blues legend, Bessie Smith.

Rogue Johnsen has performed and studied with artists whose roots dig deep into the history of Rock and Blues. He has toured extensively with W.C. Clark, Archie Bell and the Drells, and Miss Lavelle White, and he and his trio have been the opening act for many well known Blues artists, including B.B. King, Albert King, Buddy Guy and others.

Patty Reese and Dave Chappell are fan favorites in the Mid-Atlantic region.
Over the years, both have individually been awarded with many WAMMIES (Washington Area Music Awards) and other recognition. Patty's strong songwriting, dynamic vocals and solid guitar work make

her a powerful act. Dave Chappell is one of the most sought-after and respected musicians in the DC area. He has performed with several Rock and Roll Hall of Fame legends and can also be heard frequently at area clubs, often performing with other area favorites. The solo/duo act of Patty Reese and Dave Chappell won the 2017 DCBS Solo/ Duo Competition, and they are taking this strong act to the 2018 IBC.

Acts from other Blues Societies all over the US and abroad — Australia,

Israel, Croatia, etc. — compete in the IBC. The Baltimore Blues Society does not have an entry this year. However, the River City Blues Society of Virginia, based in Richmond, is sponsoring Tom Euler Band in the Band category and Parker & Gray in the Solo/Duo. The band Barrelhouse and the solo/duo act Jon Hay & Zach Lees are representing the Central Delaware Blues Society.

The Natchel Blues Network, in the Hampton

Roads area of Virginia, is sending In Layman Terms and Ruth Wyand to the IBC, in the Band and Solo/Duo categories, respectively. Many DCBS members may recall that In Layman Terms includes brother and sister Cole and Logan Layman, who first performed with their mother at the Annual DCBS Fish Fry several years ago. Since then, Cole and Logan have competed at the IBC several times in the Youth and Band categories. This year, Guitarist Cole and Bassist Logan are joined by Hamad Barbarji on trumpet and Austin Pierce on drums.

In addition to IBC's live performances and competitions, the winner of the Best Self-Produced CD competition will be announced during the IBC finals. DCBS is pleased to have a nominee in that category, Patty Reese, for her CD *Let In The Sun*.

The DC Blues Society held its annual elections for the Board and for Officers on Dec. 5.

The outgoing Board unanimously re-elected Nick Dale, Dorothy Hines, Kenny Johnson, Felix McClairen, Sam'i Nuriddin and Pete Salsbury.

In addition, the Board unanimously welcomed three new members. They are **Pat Bransford,** who has long been involved in almost every phase of our activity for years, but never formally joined the Board; **Michelle Hannahs,** who brings a wealth of non-profit organization management and musical knowledge; and **John Neumann,** who has been assisting in our planning for some time and brings extensive musical and networking connections.

The Board also thanked two outgoing members, **Sophia Baker**, who reorganized

our merchandise operations and **Peter Bloom**, who was Secretary and gave us some fresh perspectives.

The Board also wants to recognize the enormous contributions made by Felix in over a dozen years as President and his energy, effort, ideas and leadership in every phase of our activities. He stepped down in August because of personal relocation outside of the metropolitan area, but will continue to assist as a Board member.

After the election of the Board, the new Board elected the Officers for the coming year. Nick, the long-time Vice President who assumed the acting Presidency on Felix's resignation, was elected President. He also continued as Treasurer. Pete was elected the new Vice President. 

DC Blues Society: 2017 — A Year at a Glance

Throughout 2017, the all-volunteer-run DCBS continued to produce several ongoing events and to provide other benefits to its members and non-members. Below is a quick look at the past year.

- ▲ Each month, a **free 1st Sunday Jam** lit up the Silver Spring American Legion with the sound of Blues, hosted by DCBS jam master and board member Sam'i Nuriddin. We celebrated DCBS's 30-year anniversary with special activities at the December 2017 Jam; photos on page 3.
- ▲ Each month (except Nov./Dec.), a **free 4th Friday Happy Hour** brought
 musicians, dancers and Blues fans to
 Silver Spring American Legion. A live
 band performed each month, including
 Full Power Blues, I Witness Blues, The
 Mojo Priests, Cooking with Gas, DC
 Mudd, Cadillac Jump Band, Gayle Harrod
 Band, and The Feelgood Band (for a
 Halloween Happy Hour).
- ▲ On a somewhat quieter but no less enjoyable note, from February until September, a new free **3rd Sunday Acoustic Jam** was held at the Silver Spring American Legion, hosted by Rogue Johnsen. This jam began to draw an increasing number of attendees before fall sessions were cancelled because the Legion wanted the room available on Sundays during football season.
- The hottest event of the DCBS year, the 13th Annual Hotter-Than-July Fish Fry & Show, took over the Silver Spring American Legion on July 15. Five bands performed: An impromptu jam band comprising Sam'i Nuriddin, Vince Vigliotti, Larry Hale, and Van Caldwell; DC Envoy; Three Song Sadie; The Mojo Priests; and Ron Hicks Project. We fried delicious fish and devoured tasty sides, we tapped toes, we enjoyed conversation with and the company of DCBS friends and guests, we cut a rug, and we had a phenomally fantastic time!
- ▲ Competition among some of the area's finest Blues bands heated up at the **Annual Battle of the Bands** on Aug. 19 at the Silver Spring American Legion,

- Four bands brought their "A" games in their efforts to represent DCBS at the 2018 International Blues Challenge: What Brave Souls, The Mojo Priests, The Gayle Harrod Band, and the winning band, Lady D & The Rogue Johnsen Trio.
- ▲ Three one- or two-person acts vied for the opportunity to represent DCBS at the 2018 IBC at the **Annual Solo/Duo Competition** on Sept. 9 at the Silver Spring American Legion: Carly & Sol, Mat Edwards, and the winning act, Patty Reese & Dave Chapell.
- ▲ The 10th Annual College Park Blues Festival was held on Nov. 4 at Ritchie Coliseum, with performances by Patty Reese & Dave Chapell, Lady D & The Rogue Johnsen Trio, Bad Influence, and the Lionel Young Band. The Festival was presented by DCBS and the College Park Recreation Board.
- A Ringing in the New Year is always a blast at the DCBS **Annual New Year's Eve Dinner Dance** on Dec. 31, at the Silver Spring American Legion. I Witness Blues Band provided music to bid farewell to 2017. See photos on pages 6-7.
- ▲ The DCBS Internet radio show continued to air 4–6 pm, Fridays, throughout the year on Caldonia's Crossroad Radio. It is hosted by Cadillac Chris (aka DCBS Key Volunteer Chris DeProperty). www.caldoniascrossroad.com
- ▲ In 2017, the **DCBS website**, **www**. **dcblues.org**, was revamped to increase its user friendly qualities and to include an online blues calendar. New DCBS volunteer, Chris Adams, developed and implemented the website and continues to maintain and update the site.
- ▲ Throughout the year, DCBS published its newsletter, CAPITAL BLUES MESSENGER almost monthly, (there were no issues for three months due to extenuating circumstances). Weekly eblast emails were also sent with Blues news and offers of ticket giveaways to Blues performances at The Hamilton, Strathmore and other local venues. DCBS continued to offer the discounts highlighted on page 11.

- ▲ Unfortunately, 2017 was the first year in 29 years that there was no **Annual DC Blues Festival**, which has traditionally entertained crowds at the Carter Barron Amphitheatre on Labor Day Weekend. The Amphitheatre was closed suddenly in summer 2017 after the stage area was declared unsafe. DCBS was unable to identify, in the time period available, an acceptable alternative venue. DCBS sincerely regrets not having a 2017 DC Blues Festival and is working on ideas for a 2018 event.
- ▲ Membership: In January 2017, DCBS had 334 members. By the end of the year, that number had dropped to 235 members, a significant decline. One reason for the decline was the absence of a spike in new members that typically occurs around the Annual DC Blues Festival. In 2018, DCBS will be putting a great deal of effort into increasing its membership.
- ▲ In October 2017, long-standing **DCBS President Felix McClairen** stepped down from his post. Felix has worked tirelessly for more than 12 years as DCBS President, and his leadership will be missed. He also retired from his fulltime employment (his non-DCBS work) and expects to be spending significant time outside the DC area. Felix wants to continue to be supportive of DCBS and to remain a Board member for the immediate future. DCBS Vice President, Nick Dale, assumed the Acting President role in October, and in the annual Board elections in December, was voted into the President role.

2018 promises to be an exciting and active year for DCBS. A number of new volunteers have joined the Board and/ or have become active participants in developing ideas for DCBS events and projects, including options for a 2018 DC Blues Festival.

Meet A Relatively New DCBS Key Volunteer

Chris Adams: The person behind the redesigned DCBS website

Within months of his first meeting with the DCBS Board, Chris had a prototype for the Board to review and then was able to go live with the new website.

We asked Chris to share a little bit about himself. Here's what he had to say:

"My interest in the Blues started when I was a teenager listening to classic rock artists like Led Zeppelin, Jimi Hendrix and others. I was also learning to play the guitar at the same time. As I learned more and more about the artists whose music I was listening to and trying to learn on the guitar, I learned how much the Blues influenced them.

That led me to start listening to all kinds of Blues artists, from Delta Blues to Chicago Blues and more. The more I listened and learned, the more I liked. My personal favorites include

Stevie Ray Vaughan, B.B. King, Buddy Guy, Joe Bonamassa and Derek Trucks, but that's just the beginning. I could go on and on.

I started creating websites for my bands when the World Wide Web started getting popular. I'm a do-it-yourself kind of person so I figured I could do it instead of paying someone else to do it. Besides, my bands never made enough money to pay someone else for a website.

I taught myself, mainly by reading books



and doing research online. I've also built websites for several businesses, including a couple of horse farms and a laboratory equipment company.

I saw that the DC Blues Society was looking for someone to build a new website. I figured volunteering to build a new website for DCBS would be a great way to combine my interests and my desire to help support Blues music."

LITTLE STEVEN VAN ZANDT AND JOHN OATES JOIN MUSICIANS AND FANS FROM AROUND THE GLOBE FOR THE 34TH INTERNATIONAL BLUES CHALLENGE

Memphis will be alive with the blues Jan. 16–20 when The Blues Foundation hosts its annual summit

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — The Blues Foundation's 34th annual International Blues Challenge definitely is about competition; however, the five-day celebration also is about community. Musicians, music business professionals and fans converge in Memphis every year not just to hear the terrific blues being played in the Challenge and the many other showcase events, but also to enjoy the entire IBC experience, which includes expert panels, master classes, documentary movie screening, a memorabilia auction, a Blues Hall of Fame memorabilia unveiling, networking events, and receptions for blues societies, fans, and professionals. It is a wonderful and unique opportunity to salute the past, present and future of this American-bred musical style that is loved around the world.

The International Blues Challenge certainly stands as the centerpiece of the Blues Foundation's signature event. Hundreds of musicians from across America, as well as from more than a dozen other countries, come to Memphis to play their hearts out, hoping to nab top honors in the Challenge's five performance categories: best band, best solo/duo act, best band guitarist, best solo/duo guitarist, and best harmonica player.

The International Showcase kicks off the festivities Tuesday, Jan. 16, at 5 p.m. With



its stellar lineup of talented blues players from around the world, this is a celebration of music that transcends race, creed, and culture. It's quite appropriate then that the concert is held at the historic Clayborn Temple, the site of numerous Memphis civil rights events during the 1960s. Beginning Wednesday evening, the Challenge's competition shows will commence at 21 different Beale Street venues, and continue through Friday the 19th, culminating Saturday with the IBC Finals event starting at high noon in the iconic Orpheum Theatre.

The Challenge, however, represents only one part of the IBC's exciting activities. Each day comes packed with a variety of musical performances as well as special events:

The Blues Hall of Fame Museum welcomes John Oates for a book signing and conversation. He'll share stories from his autobiography, Change of Seasons, and discuss his latest CD project, *Arkansas*, which began as a tribute to Mississippi John Hurt.

Little Steven Van Zandt is one of the participants at the "Blues and Social Action" panel at the Blues Hall of Fame. The panel discussion looks at how the Blues can be used to create a better world.

Blues music's societal role also is at the heart of the IBC's Keynote Panel — "AAB: Addiction, Abuse, and the Blues." This panel examines blues music's relationship with the struggles that individuals have with addiction and abuse.

The Blues Hall of Fame welcomes the late Lonnie Brooks' guitar and signature hat into its collection. Ronnie Baker Brooks and Wayne Baker Brooks, the sons of the late, great Chicago bluesman, and family members will share stories about their father. This year's featured documentary, SHAKE 'EM ON DOWN: THE BLUES ACCORDING TO FRED McDowell, will be screened. The acclaimed one-hour film takes a look at the life of the legendary musician who was a major figure in the North Mississippi blues scene.

At a special luncheon on Friday, the Blues Foundation salutes the recipients of the 2018 Keeping the Blues Alive Awards in the Doubletree Hotel's Grand Ballroom. Twelve individuals and organizations — including Don Hooker and daughter Sarah, founders and coordinators of the annual Cheapeake Bay Blues Festival — are being recognized for their work to bring more awareness to the Blues.

Showcases and jam sessions provide a bevy of marvelous music listening opportunities day and night throughout the IBC, ranging from the Pacific Northwest Showcase, and the Great Canadian Polar Bear Blues Showcase to the National Women in Blues' Annual Showcase and the International Jam. All Star Jams and the Youth Showcases complete events on Thursday and Friday. DCBS reps Patty Reese and Dave Chappell are performing in the Roots and Blues Showcase on Thursday.

Bob Margolin participates in an exciting program of Master Classess teaching electric guitar workshops, with Bob Corritore leading an harmonica class, Danny Banks teaching a drum class, and Russell Jackson running a workshop on upright and electric bass. Doug MacLeod holds a master class in his specialties: the slide guitar and special blues tuning for guitar.
