





Member Spotlight

BoZee the Clown



"The first time I heard about the DC Blues Society was in 2006. I came to an Open Mike at the Surf Club with a friend named Harold," **Norman Bowlding**, a.k.a **BoZee the Clown**, recalls. "**Mike Hardaway** at the Surf Club was the first Blues show I seen."



Althoughheconcedes that there are a few places to catch the Blues in town. Norman believes "there are not many places easy to find that won't take your arm off. Mostly, he loves to hang out at Westminster ("They serve good dinners at the Monday shows,") and the Surf Club. "I always have a lotta fun with the crowd, and Chick Hall [the Surf Club's proprietor] is a good friend."

It was at the Surf Club where Norman and his alter-ego BoZee came to the DC Blues Society. He met Blues in the Schools coordinator **Chet Hines** (a.k.a. **Dr. S.O. Feelgood**) and called him to join the Society. Soon he was volunteering to do what he does best. "Bozee is a catalyst for fun," says Society president **Felix McClairen**. "He's an aggressive, resourceful volunteer in terms of getting the word out and encouraging new members."

Guerrilla marketing comes natural to BoZee. This self-trained D.C. native has been clowning since 1978, taking his first job at a birthday party as a hobo named **Hoggie**. Shortly afterwards, he switched to Bozo out of admiration for the Chicago-based clown. When his namesake **Bob Bell** passed away in 1997, Norman changed his name to BoZee out of respect for Bell's family.

Since then, BoZee has performed at picnics, birthday parties, the Ohio State Fair, the D.C. Carnival, New Year's Eve at the Indian Embassy, and of course at DC Blues Society functions, He has a great routine he does with kids: a Bo Diddley skit. "I give kids instruments, dress 'em up and give them a prize."

As far as Blues goes, BoZee claims electric Blues as the "Real Blues." He's a big fan of **Jimmy** Reed calls and Memphis Gold the "Top Guitar." His favorite Blues album these days? Simpsons Sing the Blues. "You'll laugh until you hear it," he says.



Corey Harris Daily Bread (Rounder)



Popular music is undergoing a renaissance that will soon make the Sixties look like the Nineties. Of course that begs the question for the Blues: can we get our answer to **John Legend**, **Abdel Wright** or **Wyclef Jean**? Absolutely! In the person of **Corey Harris**.

In Mississippi to Mali, Corey Harris's

master's thesis was intended as a reconciliation of sorts—parceling the Diaspora, bringing the Blues full-circle from griot to guitarist. So what does that make Harris's follow-up, *Daily Bread*?

Daily Bread may be the most revolutionary Blues album since Disraeli Gears, but it is not a doctoral piece. That will have to wait until Blues producers buy into a fatter bottom. Sparse, tinny arrangements do not sound authentic, which is a pity because every single song is steeped in spirituality and self-reflection that have been sorely missing from Pop music as a whole, and recent Blues in particular. But the instrumentalists are first-class and Harris's guitar is incredible. This collection of eclectic tunes will sing in your head long after they've been played.

Maria Muldaur Naughty, Bawdy & Blue (Stony Plain)



Maria Muldaur's newest CD on Stony Plain honors the memories and music of groundbreaking blueswomen Ma Rainey, Victoria Spivey, Sippie Wallace, Bessie Smith, and Alberta Hunter. Naughty, Bawdy & Blue features a dozen songs straight from the urban parlors, backrooms and bordellos of the 20's and 30's, and offers a more

polished sound than these bluewomen's more rough-hewn Mississippi Delta contemporaries. Maria's got James Dapogny's Chicago Jazz Band on most of Naughty, Bawdy & Blue, complete with period instruments, such as the clarinet, trumpet, tuba, and banjo. Dapogny, a Professor of Music at the University of Michigan, is a world-renown musicologist and authority on ragtime and Jelly Roll Morton. That expertise shines through on this CD, and it's a reunion of sorts: James and his band backed Sippie Wallace, along with Bonnie Raitt, on Wallace's 1982 W.C. Handy-award winning Atlantic release, Sippie. On Naughty, Bawdy & Blue, Bonnie joins Maria on a soulful version of Wallace's "Separation Blues." Naughty, Bawdy & Blue is another solid example of Maria's tireless quest to keep the music of early

blueswomen current. Both *Richland Woman Blues* (2001) and her tribute to **Memphis Minnie**, *Sweet Lovin' Ol' Soul* (2005), earned W.C. Handy and Grammy nominations. My favorites on *Naughty, Bawdy & Blue* include Maria's saucy interpretation of Alberta Hunter's "Handy Man," a jaunty reading of Victoria Spivey's "One Hour Mama," and a playful "Empty Bed Blues" that Bessie Smith would appreciate. If you liked *Richland Woman Blues* or *Sweet Lovin' Ol' Soul*, you'll love *Naughty, Bawdy & Blue*.


